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Sentence Fragments

A <u>sentence fragment</u> is an incomplete sentence. Fragments are not only grammatically incorrect, but they also tend to be confusing for the reader. Some examples of fragments are listed below. The portion written in <u>red</u> indicates a fragment.

1. (ex.) I'm wearing a sweater today. Because it's cold out.

A fragment such as this can be fixed by removing the period in between the two sentences to create one longer sentence. "I'm wearing a sweater today" is a full sentence. "Because it's cold out" is a phrase being used to add detail or context in this situation, and it is not a full sentence on its own.

(ex. corrected) I'm wearing a sweater today because it's cold out.

2. (ex.) She knew the speech by heart. Which was impressive because it was a long one.

This type of fragmented sentence can be fixed by changing the punctuation in between the two sentences. "She knew the speech by heart" is a full sentence. "Which was impressive because it was a long one" is a dependent clause that does not express a full thought. Join the sentences together by replacing the period with a comma.

(ex. corrected) She knew the speech by heart, which was impressive because it was a long one.

3. (ex.) Apples from the grocery store.

This fragmented sentence lacks a main verb and is an incomplete sentence. Fix the sentence by adding a main verb, which will add context to the phrase "apples from the grocery store."

(ex. corrected) We bought apples from the grocery store.
